ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Delhi is a premier University of the country that has the privilege of a venerable legacy. The University was established in 1922 as a unitary teaching and residential University by an Act of the Central Legislative Assembly. The President of India is the Visitor, the Vice-President is the Chancellor and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of India is the Pro-Chancellor of the University. The vision and mission of the University foster its long term commitment to nation building and an unflinching adherence to universal human values. The values of the University are reflected in its motto: '*Nishtha Dhriti Satyam*' (Dedication, Steadfastness and Truth).

The University had a modest beginning with three colleges (St. Stephen's, Hindu and Ramjas), two faculties (Arts and Science) and about 750 students. It has now grown to become one of the largest universities in the country. Presently, the University comprises **91 Colleges**, **16 Faculties**, **86 Departments**, **20 Centres** and **3 Institutes**. It offers **540 programmes**, which include undergraduate, Masters, M.Phil., Ph.D., Certificate and Diploma programmes. In the year 2018-2019, the University has **1,93,380 undergraduate** students, **26,925 postgraduate** students including M.Phil./Ph.D. students and **7046** in Certificate/Diploma/PG Diploma students on roll. Additionally, **3,89,132** students are enrolled in the distance education mode and **30,684** students under Non Collegiate Women's Education Board.

Ever since its inception, a strong commitment to excellence in teaching, research and social outreach has made the University a role-model for other universities in the country. With the aim of emerging as a world leader in education and research, the University is dedicated to offer a diversity of well-structured educational programmes taught by distinguished faculty; a wide range of co-curricular activities; and a productive and creative work ethos. The educational programmes of the University are widely acknowledged for their innovative teaching-learning pedagogies and modern infrastructural support.

The University of Delhi's strong commitment to excellence in research is evident from its publications in highestranking peer-reviewed international Journals, high **h-index** that stands at **191** (as per Scopus database) and a total number of **7896** publications (2016-2019 (September)). Since 2014, about **30 patents** are published/awarded. There are about **90 functional MoU's** with institutions of National/ International importance. Recently, the University has established new centres and institutes of learning such as the **Delhi School of Journalism**, the **Delhi School of Transnational Affairs, Delhi School of Public Policy & Governance, Centre for Disability Studies** and the **Institute of Cyber Security and Law**.

In its pursuit to nurture high quality research, the University has established well-equipped laboratories, central instrumentation facilities, computational infrastructure and allied services. In recognition, the University has received highest University grants like DST-PURSE; grants from UGC-SAP/CAS and DST-FIST; and more than 300 individual extramural research projects. The University runs an Electropreneur Park and Technology Business Incubators to encourage translational research, entrepreneurship and employment. The University Library System is one of the largest in the country comprising multidisciplinary centralized libraries, single discipline major libraries, departmental libraries and special libraries including a Braille library. The libraries maintain automated housekeeping operations using Integrated Library Management Software named TROODON.

The value system of the University coupled with world-class education that it offers prepares and equips the students to skillfully handle the challenges of the real world associated with the diverse employment sectors. The Central Placement Cell of the University and department-based Placement Cells provide the requisite interface with industry. The alumni profile of the University includes an illustrious list of eminent persons with professional achievements from almost all spheres of human endeavour encompassing academicians, statesmen, policy makers, distinguished scientists, members of the judiciary, actors, sports personalities and many more.

Digital initiatives taken for empowering the stakeholders have further nurtured a culture of academic and administrative innovation. By migrating to the online admissions and online entrance tests, the University contributes to saving nearly 5000 trees annually - helping add a forest to the nation each year. As part of its outreach activities, the University has also implemented diverse social development initiatives that actively promote socio-economic upliftment and rural community development, thereby touching the lives of many.

Faculty members of the University are renowned leaders in their field and have been honoured with many prestigious civilian and academic awards and fellowships, such as Padma Shri, Visitor Award for Innovation, J.C. Bose National Fellowship, Discovery Award from Royal Society of London, Fellowships of Indian National Science Academy, National Academy of Sciences, Indian Academy of Sciences, the World Academy of Sciences, the Royal Society of Chemistry and the National Academy of Agricultural Sciences. Moreover, many of the faculty members are serving in prestigious International and National committees in various capacities.

A recent commendable initiative of the University is the **revision of the syllabus** of all **Undergraduate** and **Postgraduate programmes** under **Choice Based Credit System** incorporating Learning Outcome-Based Curriculum Framework. The University has also been accredited with **A+ grade** in its first cycle by **National Assessment and Accreditation Council** (NAAC), 2018.

The University of Delhi secured 1st position among the top 25 Central universities and 8th Rank among top 100 Universities by **Outlook-ICARE India University Ranking** (2019). Among Universities in India, the University of Delhi is ranked 13th by **NIRF** (2019). It is ranked 2nd by **QS India Ranking** among public universities in India and 8th among educational institutions/universities (2019). As per **QS World University Ranking**, the University is ranked 474 and attained a commendable goal of 21st global rank in **Alumni Outcomes** and 191-200 global rank in **QS Graduate Employability Index** (2020).

The University of Delhi achieved a significant distinction in terms of being recognized as the **Institution of Eminence (IoE)** by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India (2019). The strategic plan of the University of Delhi has envisioned to stimulate academic life in India as the leader among higher education institutions. As stated in the IoE vision document of the University of Delhi:

We aim to build a committed cadre of principled and self-assured leaders enabling them to take the nation forward, offer our young citizens necessary space and world-class opportunities, provide our scholars the environment and resources to become major contributors to global thought, and be aligned with the quality of international education that is essential to ensure India's preeminent position as a major educational player in the world.








Enhancing Employability and Research Skills through Areas of Learning, Graduate Attributes and Academic Programmes

- Integration of Desirable Attitudes and Behavior




Enhancement of Research and Innovation



PROGRAMMES AND ENROLLMENT


The University of Delhi provides affordable quality education to more than 6 lakh students under various streams while retaining the principles of equity, justice and social inclusion. Further, the University is recognized for initiating educational reforms and setting trends at the national and international levels.

The vision and mission of the University have been duly incorporated in the expanse and diversity of academic programmes and students enrolled. The University comprises 91 Colleges, 16 Faculties, 86 Departments and 20 Centres and 03 Institute. It offers 540 programmes, which include undergraduate programmes offered by colleges of the University, an array of postgraduate programmes (including Masters, M.Phil. and Ph.D.) and Certificate and Diploma courses.

As per the data accrued in 2018-19, the University has 1,93,380 undergraduate, 26,925 postgraduate students, including M.Phil./Ph.D. students and 7,046 in Certificate/Diploma/PG Diploma on rolls. The total number of students enrolled in conventional mode is 2,27,351. Additionally, as many as 3,89,132 students are enrolled in the distance mode and 30,684 non-collegiate women students also form part of this mammoth University. The total enrollment across conventional and distance mode in all programmes was 6,47,167 in 2018-19. At present, more than half of the students come from states other than Delhi.



Foreign students from several countries are studying at the University. Some of these countries are Afghanistan, Australia, Bangladesh, Canada, China, France, Iran, Italy, Laos, Nigeria, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Syria, Tibet, UAE, UK, USA, Uzbekistan, Vietnam and Yemen. In 2018-19, the University attracted 438 foreign students from across the world.

The approximate demand ratios for Undergraduate and Masters' programmes for the year 2018-19 were 5:1 and 13:1, respectively. The demand ratio was approximately 10:1 for Ph.D/M.Phil. in the year 2018-19. The University is also committed to the National Reservation Policy in admitting students from the marginalised sections from across the country.


RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

The University of Delhi is internationally acclaimed for excellence in research and innovation. The University is research-intensive and seeks to create and share knowledge as well as technical know-how through quality research driven by its eminent faculty. Its strong commitment to excellence in research is evident from the fact that the **h-index** of the University stands at 191 (as per Scopus database), which is highest among the Indian Universities.



Research Publications

As per the Scopus database, the total number of publications from 2014-19 are 11,603.



The research findings of the University faculty are highlighted on cover pages of the most coveted journals.



Extramural Research Grants

The University has attracted extramural research projects from almost every national funding agency and many international funding agencies like DBT, DST, IFICAR, UGC, MOEF, IAEA, ICAR, DRDO, CSIR, MOES, ICMR, MNRE, World Bank, TERI, Indo-USSTF, GAIL, IUAC, ICSSR, MCIT, NUST, University of Norway, University of Turkey, ISRO, SDTT, VigyanPrasar, SERB-DST, Japan Foundation, SEWA-THDC, MOSJ&E, DAE, MWCD, INSA, TISS-DU, Leverhulme Trust UK, ICHR etc.

In 2018-19, the University has 34 ongoing research projects with grants of more than Rs. 1 Crore and 222 ongoing research projects with grants above Rs. 10 Lakhs.

During this period there were 361 projects which were ongoing and amounted to around Rs. 272 Crores.

The University of Delhi is also the recipient of the highest DST-PURSE grant for Phase-II (2014-2019) – Rs. 40.80 Crores.

Electropreneur Park and Incubation Centres at the University A. Electropreneur Park

Electropreneur Park has been setup under the aegis of the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology, Software Technology Park of India (STPI) and India Electronics and Semiconductor Association (IESA) to support start-ups in electronic system design and manufacturing (ESDM). A holistic eco-system has been established to promote R&D, innovation, entrepreneurship in the ESDM sector in India, to enable creation of Intellectual Property, to provide assistance during prototyping, development and commercialization for the products produced through the scheme for India and other growth markets, te create employment at various levels, and to create long-term partnership with strategic sectors. The Park provides mentorships to the incubatees as per their needs e.g. Strategic, Investment, Legal, Management etc.

B. Technology Business Incubator

The Ministry of Micro, Small Medium Enterprise (MoMSME) has supported the Technology Business Incubator (TBI) at the Cluster Innovation Centre, University of Delhi (DUCIC, TBI) under the scheme "Support for Entrepreneurial and Managerial Development of SMEs through Incubators". TBI has been set up with an objective to facilitate nurturing of ideas by promoting emerging technological and knowledge based innovative ventures. DUCIC-TBI (MSME), provides funding (through MoMSME), mentoring and co-working space to students facilitate start-ups So far, eight projects have been incubated and three profitable companies have graduated.

C. Design Innovation Centre at University of Delhi with funding from the Ministry of MHRD

Design - centred innovation is a force multiplier that can help the country move up the value chain, making Indian industry globally competitive. In this context, Ministry of Human Resource Development proposed to launch a National Initiative for Design Innovation in the Twelfth Plan. Under this initiative, 20 new Design Innovation Centers (DIC), one Open Design School (ODS) and a National Design Innovation Network (NDIN), linking together all these schools, was set up. University of Delhi was one of the 5 institutions that were granted the DIC project on the first round on a Hub and Spoke model, with the following partnerships: University of Delhi (Hub); Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi (Spoke 1); Islamic University of Science and Technology, J&K (Spoke 2); NIFT, New Delhi (Spoke 3).



Total Funding provided by MHRD is **Rs. 10 Crores (Hub: 7 crores, Spoke: 1 crore each)**

Operational since July 2015, DIC, DU has carried out many design innovation projects and offered courses on design thinking and entrepreneurship. It is in the process of establishing state-of-art Design and product development facilities. It offers Fellowships, Internships and Industry Linkage Programmes to students with innovative ideas.

IPR Cell and Patent Fund

The University has guidelines for patent filing and collaborative research. A patent fund was set up for the University faculty. During the year 2018-19, three patents (2 Indian and 1 Foreign) were granted, eight patent Applications (6 Indian and 2 Foreign) were published and 3 new Indian Patent Applications were filed.

NEW ACHIEVEMENTS

INSTITUTION OF EMINENCE

The University of Delhi achieved a significant distinction in terms of being recognised as the Institution of Eminence (IoE) by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India. This distinction has been achieved as a result of the continuing efforts and contribution of our students, researchers, teachers, administrative staff, alumni and all stakeholders. It is extraordinary in the sense that the competition for a limited number of institutions to be so recognised by the MHRD was both serious and severe.

The IoE proposal focused on the broad idea-centric themes as well as on critical transformation of the way the University functions. The transformation encompasses the whole range of the University's affairs – academic, administrative and financial. The thrust in academics was placed on what we will teach, how we will teach and on how the University markets its products to meet future needs of the society and the nation and how it responds to the emerging global challenges.

The strategic plan of the University of Delhi envisions stimulating academic life in campus and beyond, leading higher education institutions in India. As stated in the IoE document:

"We aim to build a committed cadre of principled and self-assured leaders enabling them to take the nation forward, offer our young citizens necessary space and world-class opportunities, provide our scholars the environment and resources to become major contributors to global thought, and be aligned with the quality of international education that is essential to ensure India's preeminent position as a major educational player in the world."

The funding support has been sought for teaching, research and skill enhancement and development programmes under a novel interdisciplinary/multi-disciplinary theme-based initiative, modern amenities including hostel facilities and recreational facilities for resident students and staff, expansion and upgradation of health and wellness facilities, and faculty housing to offer a residential campus environment.

NAAC ACCREDITATION

The University of Delhi has gone through the process of assessment and accreditation in 2018, conducted by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), under the first cycle. This accreditation is as per the Revised Framework of NAAC, which was implemented in 2017, and where the primary focus shifted from qualitative peer judgement only (old framework) to data based quantitative evaluation (70%) and peer judgement (30%).

The University completed its application for accreditation by submitting the Self-Study Report (SSR) on February 28, 2018 to initiate this process. As part of the process, the University successfully completed the Data Verification and Validation process and Student Satisfaction Survey. NAAC peer team visited the University during October 29-30, 2018. The Peer Team Visit Schedule was made keeping in mind the wide spectrum of activities listed in the Qualitative Metrics of the SSR and validation of the claims made therein. The Peer Team carried out an in-depth verification and validation of the claims made in the Qualitative Matrices of the SSR and also interacted with Deans, Heads of Departments, administrative staff, faculty members, students and alumni to learn about the academic strength and administrative functioning of the University.

The University of Delhi was accredited with a CGPA score of 3.28 with A+ grade in its First cycle, which is valid for a period of 5 years from November 30, 2018. This grade is highest among all the Central Universities which have gone through the first cycle of assessment and accreditation under new framework till September, 2019.

GRADED AUTONOMY

The University of Delhi is one of five Central Universities to be graded as Category-I by the University Grants Commission (UGC) as per the provision of UGC (Categorisation of Universities (only) for Grant of Graded Autonomy) Regulations, 2018. The University of Delhi may, inter alia, take the following initiatives without approval of the UGC, provided no demand for funds is made from the Government:

- a. May start a new course/programme/department/school/centre in disciplines that form a part of its existing academic framework.
- $b. May open \ constituent \ units/off-campus \ centres \ within \ its \ geographical \ jurisdiction.$
- c. May start skill courses, consistent with the National Skills Qualification Framework.
- d. May open research parks, incubation centres, university-society linkage centres.
- e. May hire foreign faculty having taught at any institution appearing in top five hundred of any of the world renowned ranking frameworks.
- f. Shall be free to admit foreign students on merit, subject to a maximum of twenty percent, over and above the strength of their approved domestic students.
- g. Shall build in an incentive structure to attract talented faculty.
- $h.\,May\,engage\,in\,academic\,collaborations\,with\,foreign\,educational\,institutions.$

CURRICULUM REVISION

The University of Delhi undertook an elaborate exercise of the process of updating and modernizing all its undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in the year 2018-19 and incorporated Learning Outcome-Based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) and revised the courses under the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS). The revised courses are effective from the academic year 2019-20 and are available to the students enrolled either in regular or distance learning mode of the University. Revised undergraduate courses are also applicable to the students of School of Open Learning (SOL) as well as the students of Non-Collegiate Women Education Board (NCWEB). These courses are expected to benefit close to seven lakh students enrolled under regular and distance learning (SOL) mode as well as NCWEB. It is notable that the revised courses in distance learning mode are at par with those in conventional mode.

The revised courses take care of varied learning needs of the students in terms of learning outcomes, knowledge outcomes, skill outcomes and personality outcomes. Courses covering the varied learning needs of the students are in sync with the requirements of accreditation processes that the University needs to undergo and also to meet international academic standards.

Revision of undergraduate and postgraduate courses was done by following a democratic process involving stakeholders at various levels of curriculum development.

Revision and restructuring of 67 postgraduate programmes comprising about 2500 courses under CBCS incorporating LOCF was coordinated by the committee for postgraduate course revision. Three types of courses were listed in each programme : (i) Core courses (ii) Elective courses – specific to the discipline for students of the department, and (iii) Open Elective courses - open to the students within the same or other department subject to fulfilling of the pre-requisite eligibility to be identified by the department. All postgraduate courses were restructured and revised with total credits ranging between 80 to100 credits (including 8 credits of Open Elective courses) required for successful completion of the degree. The committee coordinating the postgraduate course revision and restructuring provided a template to all the departments for the purpose of developing courses as per LOCF requirements.

The LOCF-based undergraduate course revision (UGCR) undertaken by the University of Delhi was one of the first such initiatives in India having specified time/space for experiential learning related activities. More than 3000 faculty members from various Departments/Colleges of the University were engaged to revise the CBCS curriculum. The entire exercise was covered in four months with continuous monitoring on Picture in Picture (PinP) mode through in-house self-designed Dashboard. About 3500 courses from over 70 undergraduate programmes were covered under LOCF. Approximately 1000 Stakeholders (International and National Experts, Alumni, Students, Industry, etc.) were engaged for getting feedback and suggestions including two former Vice Chancellors. One of the highlights of the curriculum revision was outlining course objectives and weekly Teaching-Learning processes in terms of pedagogy. The course objectives were represented in term of ethics, social, cultural outlook, global knowledge, skills related to 4th Industrial Revolution, environmental resilience/sustainability and studies related to public good and CSR.

It is expected that the revised undergraduate and postgraduate courses explicating learning outcomes will help in bringing comparability of learning outcomes across universities at national and international level, and facilitate the mobility of the students in an objective way.

NEW INSTITUTIONS

The University has established the following new Centres and Institutes of Learning in recent years:

Delhi School of Journalism: The School started in September 2017 with the objective to identify and nurture aspiring journalists to enable them to become a driving force for a quality driven public sphere and information economy. The School offers a Five Year Integrated Bilingual Programme in Journalism which includes teaching of four foreign languages (French, Spanish, Chinese and Arabic) and four regional languages (Sanskrit, Tamil, Urdu and Bengali) in ten semesters (A student has to select one foreign language and one regional language). This programme is the first of its kind in India. It offers an exit option after three years, where the students will be awarded Degree of Bachelor of Journalism. Students completing two years postgraduate programme will be awarded Degree of Master of Journalism. The selection of candidates is done through an All India entrance test.

Delhi School of Transnational Affairs: The Delhi School of Transnational Affairs is established under Ordinance XX (P) of the University, which was approved in 2017 by the Executive Council. The School aims to promote excellence in transnational, comparative and interdisciplinary research. The School is envisaged as the University's academic window to the world in which ideas and studies are shared and carried out by and among various stakeholders of the academic community of the University along with scholars and practitioners from across the globe.

Centre for Disability Studies: The establishment of the Centre was approved in July, 2019 by the Executive Council. Once it is operational, it will offer Certificate, Diploma and Postgraduate degree courses and Research programmes.


Institute of Cyber Security and Law: The Institute of Cyber Security and Law is established under Ordinance XX (O) of the University, which was approved in 2017 by the Executive Council. The Institute of Cyber Security and Law has been envisaged to nurture young talent in the niche domain of cyber security and law. The Institute aspires to work for development of safe cyber security environment and secure systems and promote ethical conduct amongst the cyber security professionals. The Institute is run by a group of professionals in the field of cyber security. It is mentored by some of the leading experts in the fields of cyber security and law. The Institute offers a Postgraduate Diploma in Cyber Security and Law.

Delhi School of Public Policy & Governance: The proposal for setting up of the Delhi School of Public Policy and Governance has been approved by the Executive Council in July 2019. The vision statement of the School states, inter alia:

The vision of the School is to provide an interdisciplinary platform for learning and research on Public Policy and Governance. The School will serve as a forum where the academic rigour blends with empirical evidence and the practical experience to promote the knowledge about processes of policymaking and governance. The objective is to contribute to the design and implementation of the public policy by providing context relevant policy inputs to the policymakers. The School will serve as a springboard of purposive discourse on effective and equitable governance from the developing world view point.

EXAMINATIONS

- For the first time in 2016, the University conducted the entrance examinations in multiple cities of the country for easy access of the applicants. The University successfully conducted Entrance Examinations for all postgraduate, selected professional undergraduate programmes, M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes at 06 cities across the country including Delhi in multiple shifts.
- In 2017, conventional Pen-Paper based Entrance Examination system was replaced by Computer-based Examination system for selected professional undergraduate programmes at 13 cities across the country.
- In 2018, the Computer-based Examination system was extended to all postgraduate, M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes. The centres were spread across 18 cities.
- In 2019, the Computer-based Entrance examination was conducted by the National Test Agency in partnership with the University of Delhi at 18 cities across the country including Delhi. Live-CCTV surveillance along with technical devices was undertaken to ensure fairness of entrance examinations.
- One of the major achievements in the year 2018 was the conduct of the examinations for the School of Open Learning (SOL) exclusively at the colleges/departments of the University. It was the first time that no government, public or private school was engaged as examination centre for conducting the examinations of the SOL. Date-sheets were specially designed so that numbers of examination centers were reduced significantly from 181 to 70 and resulted in deployment of no external observers and limited infrastructure.
- The printed version of Marksheets is being provided to all final year students of undergraduate programmes from Examination Branch since 2019.
- New format of digital degrees with Logo of the University and students photograph has been introduced.



- Introduction of end-semester examination along with continuous evaluation for all practical examinations of undergraduate programmes under CBCS in 2016.
- Since 2016, the University's website has a dedicated examination portal containing relevant information related to examinations such as date-sheets, results, notifications, services and forms. Manual processing of various forms are no longer required, thus obviating long queues of students.
- Online system for submission of abstract of Ph.D. thesis was initiated. Ph.D. thesis evaluation through email and conduct of Ph.D. viva-voce examination via Skype/ Video conferencing are in place. Results of the Ph.D. students are notified on the examination portal.
- Mechanism for conversion of C.G.P.A. into percentage for final year students of undergraduate programmes under CBCS was notified in 2017.
- Online fee collection system was introduced for Transcript, Duplicate Degree/Statement of Marks, Attestation of Degree/Statement of Marks, Verification of Degree/Statement of Marks, Revaluation/Rechecking.
- Online portal for receiving marks of theory examinations, internal assessment and practical papers was started for postgraduate courses. Processing of results for all undergraduate courses and most of postgraduate courses are being conducted through result processing software. The Examination Hall Tickets, Admission Tickets and Statement of Marks are available online.
- Online applications are being accepted for Advance Degree/Duplicate Degree/Attestation of Degree/Special Certificate, etc.

EQUALITY AND MODERNIZATION IN DISTANCE LEARNING

- Online admissions are being conducted for all undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in SOL & NCWEB.
- A self-designed LMS Dashboard for individual students has been created.
- All the material including Self Learning Material is being provided online.
- Since 2019 all undergraduate and postgraduate programmes are being offered in semester mode with the updated LOCF based revised CBCS syllabus which are at par with regular College curriculum.
- Flipped-classroom technology was developed in SOL considering importance to virtual/audio-visual teaching-learning and to provide open access to all text to speech contents/study material, audio lectures and video lectures. Earlier no Audio/Video lectures, E-contents were available to SOL students.
- New Digital Library Online portal is opened for students with many online books, segregated Open Education Resources, in-house E-content and Videos, online reservation of books, etc.
- The University of Delhi is one of the first three Universities which has received Letter of Intent for offering five undergraduate programmes through Online mode from January 2020 session.
- Presently, 20 short term professional courses are offered to the students from SOL and NCWEB. Here, the students are being nurtured through practical vocational training with relevant industry interface. These courses are in the fields of Retail, Telecom, Hospitality, IT, Media, Medical Transcription, Insurance, Automotive, Travel and Tourism, Soft skills, etc.

ADMISSIONS

To ensure the fairness and efficiency of its admissions, the University has

• Adopted and implemented policies towards streamlining the student-friendly, glitch-free, online, fair and transparent Centralized Online Admission Process for undergraduate, postgraduate, M.Phil. and Ph.D. applicants since 2016 based on the theme "*Go-Green, Go-Digital and Minimum Human intervention*" with the requirement of presentation of minimum mandatory documents and returning the same after verification from either online repository or mandatory Forensic Examination.

- Centralized and detailed Information Bulletins regarding procedure and schedules of admission are available through the University Website.
- For the programmes where entrance examinations are mandatory, the examinations have been conducted in various parts of the country for wider reach-through.
- Sensitized the Admission Procedure in the University of Delhi by (a) conducting Open Days in various Colleges of Delhi, (b) reporting to digital and print media and (c) press briefing/ releases.

Delhi University Centralized Admission Management System (DUCAMS) enabled the following: a. Eligibility Check Tool to facilitate eligibility in Colleges/Departments based on their score card

- b. Applicant friendly e-Wallet to make payments
- c. Display of Course and Category wise vacant seats for applicants

 $d. \, Integration \, with \, CBSE \, was \, successfully \, achieved \, for \, the \, online \, verification \, of \, candidates' \, marks$

- e. Alerts/updates through SMS to applicants for every step in Admission Process.
- Adopted a policy to consider only those Boards from India which are recognized by the Council of Boards of School Education (COBSE) to avoid fake Boards.
- First phase of Economically Weaker Section (EWS) reservations as per the directive of the Government of India has been implemented. About 95% seats (2966 admissions in undergraduate and postgraduate programmes) were filled under EWS Category in 2019-20.
- Adopted measures to achieve $\sim 100\%$ admissions under all reserved and minority categories by launching Special-Drive.
- Video-graphed all Performance Based Admissions in Sports, Extra Curricular Activities, and Music.
- Sports quota admissions are done through a centralised, rigorous and fair process.
- Sports quota admission process is made simple and student-friendly by changing multiple sports trials in different colleges into a single sport trial for one sport.
- Like sports quota admissions, the Extracurricular Activities (ECA) admissions are simplified by arranging centralised ECA trial. Now, an applicant need not take multiple trial for one ECA; one trial will do.
- M.Phil./Ph.D. admission process is made transparent by publicizing the syllabi of the entrance examinations for admission in M.Phil./Ph.D. programmes.
- Constituted Grievance Committees for speedy and effective redressal.
- Zeroed all payment related grievances by constituting a special assistance help-desk in cooperation with the designated Bank.
- Automatic selection for women applicants from Delhi was enabled through software for NCWEB admission.
- Transfer of students from one college to another was facilitated by automatic adjustment of the admission fee.

RECRUITMENT

- Against 378 vacancies of Assistant Professors advertised in 2017, 145 vacancies were filled (around 40%).
- Total of 857 vacancies comprising 263, 428 and 166 vacancies of Assistant Professor, Associate Professor and Professor respectively were advertised in 2019. The University has received around 23,000 applications.
- Online application followed by online screening and selection are being undertaken.
- The University has shared its online recruitment platform/proforma with several other Central Universities in the country.
- The University has facilitated the appointment of approximately 3000 guest faculty in Colleges, Departments, SOL and NCWEB in 2019 following the guidelines of the UGC, while adhering to one person one job policy.

UNIVERSITY OUTREACH

Academia-Industry Linkage

The University of Delhi has always promoted the involvement of industry in contributing towards excellence in teaching and research. Several departments have established linkages with the industry as knowledge partners to ensure industry engagement with faculty and students in various ways including summer internships and placement activities, annual scholarships, specialized lectures, mentorship to students, facilitation of start-ups and innovation, research collaborations with faculty and curriculum design and development. Several faculty members of the University also offer Consultancy Services to industry and governmental organizations based on expertise in their fields. The Faculties of Management Studies, Social Sciences, Inter-Disciplinary & Applied Sciences, Commerce, Applied Social Sciences and Humanities, Sciences, Medical Sciences, Cluster Innovation Centre, Institute of Informatics and Communication are examples of some faculties and centres that have established an active interface with industry partners. The University also promotes research activities with the industry by facilitating the creation of appropriate memorandum of understanding between the University and industry partner.



Recently, industry experts participated actively in the syllabus revision of all undergraduate and postgraduate programmes of the University. More than 350 companies visited various departments and colleges and offered placements to students

pursuing courses in Science, Applied Sciences, Mathematical Sciences, Commerce, Management, Social Sciences, Humanities and Law. Students pursuing various management programmes were actively engaged with industry to acquire knowledge and skills sets required to make them more employable. Industry involvement was also strong in research programmes through undertaking of special purpose projects. Industry experts also delivered lectures and conducted workshops on entrepreneurship and innovation. The Cluster Innovation Centre organized the pilot edition of TEDx, TEDxDUCIC, on August 24, 2019 to engage individualswho can discuss new ideas and put them into action to improve the community.

Ties with Foreign Universities/Institutes

The University of Delhi puts a considerable amount of effort on international academic exchange and cooperation. The University has established around 90 MoUs with prestigious overseas universities for

information exchange, research collaboration and exchange programmes to broaden the horizons of its faculty and students. The University of Delhi has developed partnerships with world renowned institutions like University of Wollongong, Australia, University of Vienna, Austria, Renmin University of China, Universidad Externado de Colombia, Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg, Germany, University of Pecs and Eötvös Loránd University in Hungary.Under the existing academic exchange programmes, the University hosts students from various partner universities like Universidad Externado de Colombia, Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, Japan, University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada, University of Heidelberg, Germany, Universite Jean Moulin Lyon 3, France, Universite Paul-Valery Montpellier 3, France and others. The University is also a member of prestigious networks of higher education like the Association of Commonwealth Universities. Universitas 21and International Association of Universities.





Social Outreach

The University is dedicated to serving individuals, society and the nation through its outreach and community engagement activities as an attempt to contribute to national development. Departments organize various initiatives in domains such as women's empowerment, environmental sustainability, disaster response, urban community development, education, digital literacy, health and others. These initiatives are aligned to the national imperatives like Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Swachhta hi Sevaand Plastic Free Campaign. Furthermore, to pay homage to the Pulwama Martyrs, the University of Delhi organized a Blood Donation Camp. The University also commemorated the 150th Birth Anniversary Celebrations of Mahatma Gandhi through multiple community outreach activities.

The University set up the Community Development Cell four years ago. Under this Cell, five villages in Delhi have been adopted namely Jagatpur, Jharoda Majara, Mukundpur, Badarpur Khadar and Chauhan Patti. The Cell is implementing community outreach programmes through the



Department of Social Work anchored under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan of Ministry of Human Resources Development,

Government of India. Various intervention strategies have been devised for holistic transformation of the adopted villages including organization of Health and Aadhar Camps, observation of Swachhta Pakhwada, community awareness campaign on hygiene and sanitation, dissemination of information with regard to prevention of dengue through rallies, interactive sessions and distribution of pamphlets, installation of dustbins, segregation of degradable and non-degradable waste and cleaning of the drains in the villages.

Additionally, a number of activities have been undertaken by the National Service Scheme (NSS) of the University including Save Water Campaign, Teaching Slum Children, CleanlinessDrive in the community, Electoral Verification Programme, Swachhta Hi Sewa, Health Awareness Campaign and Women Empowerment.



SUSTAINABLITY INITIATIVES

The University of Delhi is committed to ushering in a culture of sustainability in its various activities. A number of practices and actions have already been put in place which clearly show the University's resolve to be at the forefront of environmental sustainability. Some sustainability initiatives are:

Environmental impact of online admission process

The University of Delhi migrated to online admission system in the academic session 2016 and this major step has not only transformed the cumbersome admission procedure, brought in absolute transparency, but has also significantly reduced the carbon footprint of this nearly two-month long activity. The sustainability dividends that have accrued from online admission system has resulted in saving of paper (40618500 sheets per annum). This activity translates into saving of nearly 4875 trees annually. Besides, the carbon footprint added by the commuting students seeking admission, invariably accompanied by parents, relatives and/or friends, prior to online admission process, added huge pollution load to Delhi's air environment, added vast quantities of plastic and other solid waste including littering of in and around the university/college campuses. If we were to add these and the associated fuel consumption for commuting, the benefits of online admissions activity alone would be enormous. Considering that more than 300,000 aspirants apply to the University for admissions, the sustainability benefits from online procedure are manifold.

Rain-water Harvesting

A committee was constituted by the University to explore the viability of installing rain water harvesting systems in the university campus and the affiliated institutions, and to co-ordinate with the National Green Tribunal (NGT) and other statutory bodies for this purpose. A number of colleges have already installed rain-water harvesting systems. The University has installed these systems at places and is fully geared to install many more in order to bolster the sustainability efforts. However, the feasibility of rainwater harvesting in North Campus is naturally constrained due to high groundwater levels in the area.



Solar Power Systems

The University approved the authorized vendors of Solar Energy Corporation of India Ltd. (SECI) to undertake the project of Installation of Solar Energy Infrastructure at the university. After following a due procurement process M/s Azure Power Ltd. was selected through tendering by the Committee for installation of Roof Top Solar Panels under RESCO model and accordingly steps were initiated for signing of an MoU. Several solar power energy systems are installed in various hostels.

LED lights installed in the University

Pursuant to the launching of the National LED Programme by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India and the decision of the Government of India for mandatory installation of LED based lighting and energy efficient equipment in all Government buildings, a committee was constituted to organize and monitor the Solar Energy Infrastructure under RESCO model and to implement Energy Efficient Lighting Solutions (installation of LED bulbs/tube lights) in the University of Delhi. 7500 LED lights have been installed in the North Campus, replacing traditional light.

Annual Flower Show

The 61st Annual Flower Show 2019 represented an ongoing tradition, and a major public outreach activity of the University of Delhi. It showcased the ecological and cultural importance of plants and beautiful flowers in everyday life. Organized by the University Garden Committee, various prizes including rolling shield trophies in different categories of floriculture were awarded to participating colleges, institutions, and schools from Delhi-NCR. Educational exhibits on Biodiversity parks of Delhi; forest conservation: productivity and livelihood, as well as herbal and medicinal plants were attended by about 7000 visitors, including children and senior citizens. A new and popular display was hosted by the Horticulture unit, Department of Environment, Govt. of Delhi. The splendor of plant biodiversity in the garden was highlighted by striking collections of tulips, exotic large and mini Dahlias, bonsais, bulbous plants, cacti and succulents.



WAY FORWARD

The University of Delhi is looking forward to implement the status of Institution of Eminence (IoE). The first step toward this recognition has been achieved in terms of DU being ranked at the topmost among Indian universities by the Expert Empowered Committee of the Ministry of Human Resource Development. DU's IoE proposal had a robust institutional architecture and mechanism to gain entry into the top 100 ranked educational institutions globally. The salient features of the proposed architecture are detailed below:

Focus on Multidisciplinary Research

The University is confident that the teaching-learning and research focus on interdisciplinary/ multidisciplinary aspects shall produce positive effects on the criteria such as Academic Reputation, Employer Reputation and Attractiveness for Faculty and Students. We intend to break away from the disciplinary silos and approach by investing in multi-disciplinary/interdisciplinary Schools which will draw on the faculty from Departments across the University and also internationally.

Engagement with Stakeholders

Engagement with stakeholders is likely to result in positive effect on our academic reputation, employer reputation and attractiveness for prospective faculty and students. However, we need to do lot more to engage with industry, Government and society to refine the questions we need to focus more on as well as to collaborate in a multi-way exchange of knowledge. We intend to deepen our engagement with stakeholders in multiple ways.

Recruit World-Class Researchers and Teachers

Infusing academic talent in terms of world class teachers and researchers will result in positive effect on prospective international faculty and students, and academic and employer reputation. To attract worldclass faculty the University shall offer competitive salaries within the national laws and regulations as identified under IoE scheme. The University is in the process of making faculty and non-teaching appointments for the vacancies, which alone will help the University of Delhi reach the required 1:10 Faculty-Student ratio and as a result jump many ranks from where we are today.



Attract Students Globally

This will not only positively impact and bolster our academic reputation, employer reputation, quality of students, but also boost our research output and quality. The University will strive to attract an increasing number of students from outside India and aim to reach 5%, 10% and 20% of students in the next 5, 10 and 15 years, respectively. We aim to make the University an attractive destination for overseas students wanting to study in India, both for non-resident Indian population as well as others from around the world interested in a high quality education.

Build Long-term Self-Sustainability

The University of Delhi would like to build a corpus that will address the issue of financial sustainability. We would like to invite alumni, corporate houses, individuals and social organizations to: contribute to (i) the University endowment, (ii) a specific project/s, e.g., setting up of a particular School/Centre or for scholarships or for a setting up of a laboratory or a seminar series in a particular discipline, (iii) campus infrastructure, e.g., residential spaces or community facilities, etc., (iv) setting up of named Chairs, (iv) research support, and (v) give and bequeathing wills. In particular, we shall approach our alumni and a planned programme of engagement with alumni will be set up.

Alumni as a Key Stakeholder

The University recognizes that the alumni are the strongest supporters of the institution and have deep interest in its welfare. The role of Alumni Affairs will be to provide life-long association with the alumni and create opportunities for learning from them while seeking their support for the University's programmes and growth.

Technology at the Core

We intend to make available the latest in technology on campus so that faculty and students are a part of the early adopters and contributors to developments utilizing the power of new technology. We envisage an online catalogue of the University Library collections and propose to strengthen IT usage and innovation in instructional computing and distance learning, improve technology in the classroom, and multi-media, distance digital learning.

World-class Campus Amenities

We recognize that to attract the best students and faculty globally, the University of Delhi must offer a wide range of amenities and services to ensure personal and academic growth and development of its students and faculty both. The University has hostel facilities for 3522 students, which is just 6.5% of our student strength. We intend to build student housing for 5000 more students.
